

Parts 1 (10 mins) and 4 (12 mins):

- Rough skim is fine, not detailed skimming.
- Read the questions first, then the passage.
- Read 2 questions at a time, with more focus on the initial question.
- Extract info from the passage based on the concepts/keywords in the question.
- Before opening the dropdown, have an answer in your head ready (where you can).
- Look at ALL four options per question as potential answers and eliminate the wrong ones. Take all options seriously.
- Spend 80% of your time in section 1 and 20% of your time in section 2.
- In section 2, identify the tone of the speaker.
- In section 2, look at the words around the blank to predict what likely will go in the box.
- In section 2, if needed, get clues from the sentences before and after the one you are on.
- For part 4 specifically, the most important thing you need to do is identify the debate/argument.

Part 2:

- Review the picture in 1.5-2 minutes.
- Look at the words around the blank to get an idea of the blank and the reference to the image.
- If needed, use the help from surrounding sentences to answer your current sentence.
- Things you missed in section 1 (questions 1 to 5) are likely going to help you with the final section's questions (questions 6 to 8). Also, the last part is not always related to the picture.

Part 3:

- Read all questions first - visualize the keypoints - then go to the paragraphs.
- Do one paragraph at a time, and then look at the questions - you can also do half a paragraph at a time if it's too complex.
- You will spend more time at the start and less time at the end.
- Match the concept, not the keywords.
- *One paragraph can have multiple answers.*
- *Each sentence can have multiple answers.*
- *There is (usually) no paragraph that will have no answers.*
- *If anything opposite is mentioned, don't match it. It's E.*
- *Whatever is unanswered at the end is E.*
